Dear Thunderbird Friends,

T's September, 1941, in the lingering days of that last, idyllic summer before America's entry into World War II. Captain George Whittell of Thunderbird Lodge has just commissioned Castle Films (how apropos) to document his 60th birthday celebration. Hollywood producers, cameramen, and technicians will soon descend upon the few small lodging houses on Lake Tahoe's North Shore.



In the ensuing weeks, Whittell underwrites the grandest event Nevada's famous Cal Neva resort has ever seen: colorful coryphées, talented musicians, late-night poker games, exquisite French cuisine, and fountains filled with champagne. The party continues at Whittell's lakefront estate as our illustrious Captain stiffly courts visiting dignitaries in one scene and boogies a jig with showgirls in another. Always a twinkle in his eye, and with his friend Mayris Chaney and her dancers at his side, Captain Whittell and his troupe tour Lake Tahoe and environs on film: Washoe Valley, Nevada State Prison, a brief visit with Nevada Governor Carville, Zephyr Cove, Emerald Bay, Meeks Bay, Tahoe City, and the East Shore. Seaplanes land on the Lake, Tahoe City Constable Harry Johanson's dog sled team performs, archery and skeet shooting take place at Sand Harbor, and a chorus line tap dances aboard

Thunderbird Yacht. Gay times in this intimate peek at Lake Tahoe's yesteryears, presented in explosive 16mm Kodachrome color, and enhanced with high-fidelity sound.

Today, our Flagship and Castle Club members relive that gilded age as they enjoy Thunderbird Lake Tahoe events in the Captain's castle: private tours, *Thunderbird* Yacht cruises, gourmet wine dinners, Thunder Thursday celebrations, and more. These fundraising activities underwrite the Thunderbird Lodge Preservation Society's charitable mission including preservation, education, and conservation. Each year, we chip away at nearly \$6-million in deferred maintenance at the Thunderbird Lodge and on the Yacht. All the while, our Donald W. Reynolds Program for Lake Tahoe History and Culture hosts hundreds of Hands-on-History school tours and thousands of visitors from around the world. The Whittell films offer a glimpse of what these guests hope to experience.

I will see you and your family at Thunderbird Lodge soon. Until then, I remain wishing you a happy summer!

George Whittell, Jr.

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


aptain George Whittell, Jr. lived an adventurous, charmed, eccentric, and generous life. Born in San Francisco in 1881, George Jr. and his twin Nicholas joined a family of great wealth. Their grandfathers had both made a fortune during the famed California gold rush, not panning for gold but shrewdly exploiting opportunities in real estate, banking, and industry. Nicholas died at age 3, leaving "Junior" as sole heir to the Whittell fortune.

YOUTH, EARLY MARRIAGES, AND A FOUR-LEGGED BEST FRIEND

While Anna and George Sr. were no doubt hoping their son would excel in a fine university, succeed in the family business, and marry the proper San Francisco debutant, Junior had other ideas. He succumbed to the thrill of adventure and joined the Barnum and Bailey Circus at age 17, going on safaris and developing animal training skills. This relatively brief foray resulted in a lifelong passion for game animals, especially big cats. At his California Woodside Estate, Whittell eventually maintained a private zoo filled with lions, tigers, elephants, zebras, bears, and more.

After his time with the circus, George Jr. entered into two unsuccessful, and in his parents' eyes, inappropriate marriages. At the age of 21, he shocked them by eloping with chorus girl Florence Boyer. Sufficient money was paid to annul the match, which was discovered when Boyer sued, causing quite the public scandal. Finding love once again, George fled to New Jersey to marry a member of the Floradora Sextet, his second wife, Josephine Cunningham. The elder Whittell's gave into George's persistence, and accepted their new daughter-in-law. Within months, however, Josie filed for divorce to return as a stage performer. However, he and his second wife, Josephine, remained friends. Later, Josie presented George with a unique wedding present on the occasion of his third marriage to Elia Pascal: a lion cub named "Bill" who went everywhere with his master including bars and racing events.





THE WAR YEARS AND A GILDED AGE

Once again seeking adventure, Whittell enlisted in the Italian army upon the outbreak of World War I. He served as an ambulance driver, enjoying the same speed thrills as he experienced back home in California while driving one of his five Duesenberg automobiles. He later served in the French army and finally in the U.S. military once his native country entered the War. It was during his military service that Whittell obtained the title of Captain, one that he relished and used for the rest of his life.

Laid up in a French hospital after a minor injury, he fell in love with his young volunteer nurse, Elia, who became his wife of 50 years after their marriage in 1919. Elia and George sailed aboard their 135-foot yacht, flew about in their DC-2 aircraft, and lived a charmed life.

PREMONITION AND BUYING LAKE TAHOE

Shortly before the "Crash of 1929", Captain Whittell liquidated \$50 million from the stock market. This move, either as a result of a premonition or an inside tip, saved the family fortune and caused him to seek residency in Nevada after California enacted its state income tax that same year. After moving part time to Reno, Whittell purchased approximately 45,000 acres of timberland on the east shore of Lake Tahoe. Priced at a mere \$6 an acre for the lakefront and \$3 an acre in the back country, George Jr. and his partners had plans of developing casinos and house lots. Whittell decided on a beautiful and centrally located rocky point for the construction of his new summer cabin, to be

named Thunderbird Lodge. After experiencing the peace and beauty, and enjoying the wildlife of the property, Whittell aborted his plans to develop. He jettisoned his partners and except for a few forced sales, never sold or developed his land. He enjoyed his solitude at Thunderbird Lodge for most of his remaining summers.


DEATH AND LEGACY

Despite heavy drinking, smoking, military service, and dangerous living via early airplanes, fast cars and boats, Mr. Whittell lived a long life. Melanoma took the Captain at age 87 on April 18, 1969. In his will, the childless Whittell took care of Elia and his nurse, but left the vast bulk of his millions to animal protective organizations including the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, the Defenders of Wildlife, and the Audubon Society. His generosity no doubt benefitted a plethora of animals, but his real legacy lies in the undeveloped east shore of magnificent Lake Tahoe. Whittell's resistance to build on his pristine land proved instrumental in preserving approximately two thirds of his original holdings for the enjoyment of people and wildlife alike.

Today, the Thunderbird Lodge Preservation Society maintains and restores Captain Whittell's Thunderbird Lodge and Yacht. The Society educates thousands of visitors and schoolchildren, and conducts conferences to help protect Lake Tahoe's fragile resources.



of Whittell Films Needed



In 1989, Montgomery Gallery of San Francisco auctioned off many of George Whittell's personal effects at his Woodside, California estate. Among historical items to change hands that day were two collections of Whittell family films. Through the generosity of donors John Nelson and Bill Davis, and Keith and Jane Rongey, these glimpses into Lake Tahoe's past have returned home where they can be preserved, digitized, interpreted, and incorporated into the programs of the non-profit Preservation Society.

Brittle and fading, our first step was to capture the old films' content. As a stop gap measure to capture the content of the films, we turned to Allan Cruet of M2DVD. He timely and professionally transferred these many reels to digital media. We recognized this would be a low-cost, draft quality, preliminary effort. However, we can now see the Captain and chums frolicking in the pool at Death Valley's Furnace Creek Resort, flying high above New York City and Niagara Falls in Whittell's DC-2 aircraft, cavorting with Jack Dempsey, and visiting Hoover (Boulder) Dam in its first months of operation.



Captain Whittell was a consummate prankster and is said to have once painted his pet elephant pink so as to frighten his pals following an all-night bender.









Nearly half the 16mm reels are shot in brilliant Kodachrome color. Some film reels are further enhanced with "high fidelity" sound. All of the film will require a serious conservation effort before deteriorating for eternity.

After much debate, we've adopted a 4-point plan for the films:

- 1) Obtain bids for a professional film laboratory to digitize each film reel using a high-resolution, frame-by-frame scanning process.
- 2) Incorporate movie segments into a new 10-minute multi-media experience that we will use to launch our public and school tours. We'll need to produce this new feature and buy all of the associated equipment to install in the Lighthouse Room for showings (ideally) in 2014.
- 3) Work with PBS affiliates or others to produce a Whittell-Thunderbird documentary suitable for airing to a national audience and for sale through various online and retail outlets to raise funds for the preservation of Thunderbird Lodge and Yacht.
- 4) Throw a screening party for our elite members and the community to underwrite these conservation efforts. We will show the raw, unedited footage just as George Whittell enjoyed it.

This will be an expensive undertaking, likely requiring in excess of \$200,000 to preserve more than four hours of never before seen Lake Tahoe history for all to enjoy. Researchers will wish to access the digitized media for historical, planning, documentary, and artistic purposes. Where else might one grasp the bold, vivid colors accenting the totem poles that once lined the main street of Tahoe City? Or the verdant hillsides of Incline Valley before development? Or Jake Obexer, looking sharp in his white outfit, pushing off from his Standard Oil dock destined for an amicable game of cards with Captain Whittell? These are the jewels of history and you can help us share them with generations to come.

THUNDERBIRD TOURS

Children must be at least six years old. Comfortable, walking shoes are required and a warm jacket is recommended. There is no public boat access to Thunderbird Lodge.

PUBLIC TOURS BY LAND

Public tours by land operate Tuesday through Saturday from the Incline Village-Crystal Bay Visitors Center located on the north shore of the lake where you check-in and depart via shuttle to Thunderbird Lodge. Tickets are \$39 per adult and \$19 for children ages 6 to 12.



NEW SOLETTI-STYLE FRONT GATE

Graces Entry to Thunderbird Lodge Estate


y commission of Captain George Whittell, Italian immigrant Antonio Soletti handcrafted and installed nearly all of the ironwork one enjoys at Thunderbird Lodge. One great mystery, however, is that of the missing front gate. No photos of an original gate have ever surfaced. Lore has it that an original "Soletti Gate" was removed when Jack Dreyfus owned the property from 1972–1999, to be replaced by the garden-variety gate we've known for years. However, if Soletti built a front gate for Whittell at Thunderbird Lodge (as he did for Whittell's Woodside, California estate), why did Whittell commission Reno Iron Works to draft plans for a gate in 1940? The Reno Iron Works plans were garish more like the style from the French Quarter of New Orleans than matching the design of Thunderbird Lodge—and the gate was, near as we can tell, never built. Therefore, in recent times, Thunderbird Lodge has never had a gate worthy of its grand entryway.

In 2011, Bill and Carol Meehleis of Meehleis Modular Building in Lodi, California, adopted the dismal front gate replacement project. When Bill and Carol sink their teeth into something, they bring home the bacon, whether it's building a boathouse on a small lake in their home town or recreating a Soletti masterpiece. First, they researched the existing Soletti ironwork and made pattern templates of various deer, pine trees and art forms. Without any cost to Thunderbird Lake Tahoe, the Meehleis team crafted, welded, fit, welded some more, and fit again. The unfinished gate made several trips between the Lodi factory and Lake Tahoe. After the gate received a powder coat finish of gloss black to match other restored ironwork on the property, Bill and Carol oversaw installation in early June of this year. Check out our new front gate. It perfectly complements the historic Soletti ironwork and we think the Old Master would be proud. Soon a solar-powered electric opener will operate the gate, once again, through the generosity of Bill and Carol Meehleis and their family and friends.

This is just one more tale of preservation in progress and how, over many years, one family has supported Thunderbird Lake Tahoe in so many special ways. Thank you Bill and Carol Meehleis and family.





LEGACY GIFTS

ike many non-profit organizations, the future of Thunderbird Lake Tahoe rests with its permanent Preservation Fund, or endowment. The Preservation Fund consists of major gifts received from individual donors, businesses, family foundations, private foundations, and donor-advised funds at community foundations. The Preservation Fund's corpus—or principal balance—is never touched; only the investment income the corpus earns is used for capital preservation projects for both the Thunderbird Lodge and *Thunderbird* Yacht.

To sustain preservation of these historic treasures, the Preservation Fund must grow to \$20 million. With thanks to the Donald W. Reynolds Foundation and individual donors, Thunderbird Lake Tahoe's Preservation Fund is at 25% of the goal.

CASTLE CLUB

Despite these difficult times, Thunderbird Lake Tahoe occasionally receives major gifts of \$100,000 or more to its Preservation Fund. These major contributors to the Preservation Fund are automatically inducted into the Thunderbird Castle Club.

And matching gift opportunities are presently available. Other donors have pledged to match \$100,000 and higher contributions to the Preservation Fund dollar-for-dollar.

There are many ways to structure a Castle Club contribution including multiyear gifts, transferring unappreciated stocks or securities, gifting an I.R.A. distribution, establishing a matching gift campaign, granting funds from a family foundation or donor-advised fund, or making a bequest from your estate.

MAKING A BEQUEST



THE GARDENERS

ow do our gardens grow? According to visitors to Thunderbird Lodge, they are more beautiful each year, thanks to the dedicated work of volunteer gardeners, most of them certified master gardeners.


Work begins in May, with Mondays set aside for the gardening crew. Snow or rain usually plays havoc with the schedule, but the "chain gang" jumps in, filling bags of winter debris and firing up the chain saw to clear manzanita and dead branches. Then, after spreading twenty bags of mulch, the planting begins.

By June, the gardens begin to bloom. The newest garden, the herb garden, is the playground for our resident Chef de Cuisine, Anne Wiles, who goes out with her basket to harvest fresh herbs for her culinary preparations. The challenge for the gardeners is keeping the critters, not so fondly named "the grinnies," from munching before Chef Anne gets to pick them.

The critters have a hard time because, over the years, the gardeners have learned what they can successfully plant. The plants that go in the pots around the grounds are planted in the gardens at the end of the season, to bloom again another year. And, this year a new garden next to the restored waterfalls will become a showcase garden.

The gardens are funded by a grant from Lake of the Sky Garden Club and the Thunderbird Lodge general fund. So, tour dollars and donor gifts fund the beautiful gardens each year.

Most surprising, the chain gang is a group of women! Men are actively sought, but somehow they don't seem able to handle the 6 hour Mondays. ike so many of the documents, artifacts, and furnishings at Thunderbird Lodge (and aboard *Thunderbird* Yacht), the Whittell films came to us from patrons who elected to forego selling for profit on Ebay and gifting the material directly to the non-profit Thunderbird Lodge Preservation Society.

There is still much Whittell and early Lake Tahoe material out there ranging from items auctioned at the 1987 Woodside Estate Sale following Whittell's death, to items once possessed by Whittell caretakers and staff but now undiscovered or untended by descendants, to early photos and books of Lake Tahoe, San Francisco, and the Sierra Nevada region, to entire Duesenberg automobiles which might one day return home. Early Nevada, California, and Lake Tahoe documents, material, artifacts, souvenirs, post cards, letters, advertisements, photographs, films, fit our purview, and will be conserved with museum-quality care when gifted to the Preservation Society. 
